



PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

Public transport in Budapest is provided by Centre for Budapest Transport (known to all Hungarians simply as BKK). Budapest has an efficient public transport network. In general the buses, trams and trolleybuses operate between 4:30 AM and 11 PM. All-night bus service operates on the major thoroughfares in the city (night bus timetables are posted at stops and in most metro stations). The four metro lines intersect at Deák Square in the centre of the town, and at Keleti railway station Metros run at 2-15 minutes intervals from about 4.30 AM to 11.15 PM. There are also five suburban railway lines (HÉV) serving the outskirts of the city. For maps, timetables, ticket and pass information etc. see www.bkk.hu

PARKING

If you drive a personal or rented car, always try to park at a guarded parking lot and do not leave any valuables in the car. Please note, that Budapest is divided into paying parking areas, with one parking meter in each street. The maximum parking time duration is 2 hours, tariffs may vary. STRATEGIC COOPERATION IN BIODIVERSITY ENGAGEMENT

EAZA has recently signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Ecsite, the European network of science centres and museums, and Botanic Gardens Conservation International (BGCI). Dr. Omedes will outline how our institutions have evolved similarly in their missions, along with the synergies that make cooperation not only possible but highly beneficial. With partner values and missions that overlap in many areas, the MoU represents a shared vision of local scientific centres of excellence. Together, we can grasp a future that not only raises awareness of biodiversity and its importance, but which also provides the opportunities for the public to play a central role in the conservation of nature both locally and globally. Through joint campaigns and other initiatives, the MoU partners aim to put biodiversity at the heart of everyone's agenda from government leaders to local communities.



Dr Anna Omedes is a biologist (Universitat Auònoma de Barcelona) and has a PhD in Animal Behaviour (University College of Wales, UK, 1981).

Director of the Zoology Museum of Barcelona since 1997 and of the Natural Sciences Museum of Barcelona since 1999 and author of its Museological project. Project manager of the new site, the "Museu Blau", and co-curator and coordinator of the 3,000 sqm Permanent Exhibition "Planet Life" (2011). Member of the Steering Committee of the Ecsite Nature Group, of the Board of Icom NatHist and of the Executive Council of ICOM Spain between 2004 and 2010. Author and editor of articles and books on Museology, museography and Bioacoustics.

Conservation Plenary

As the Pole to Pole campaign gains momentum, the Conservation Committee is looking to expand the scope of the campaign to include petitioning of the European Parliament and the United Nations. The plenary will show how Pole to Pole can provide assistance to initiatives on climate change proposed by IUCN, and how we can maximize their effectiveness. The plenary will also provide an update on the campaign so far, the principles of the behaviour change methodology it uses, and an update on the progress of projects supported by previous campaigns.

Ape project: Protection and Restoration of Critical Ape Habitat in Southern Borneo, Indonesia

The Sabangau peat-swamp forest in southern Borneo is home to the world's largest remaining orang utan population and the largest known population of the southern Bornean gibbon. The forest and these globally important primate populations are threatened, however, by ongoing swamp drainage and subsequent fire, plus illegal wildlife hunting and small-scale illegal logging.

Together with our local partners and the local community, we have been working to counter these threats by carrying out forest patrols, extinguishing forest fires, damming drainage channels, replanting burnt and cleared areas, and monitoring the success of these efforts by assessing their impact on the area's orang utans and gibbons. These efforts have resulted in increased protection for the area's flagship ape species populations, but an on-going commitment is required to secure their continued long-term protection.

Southeast Asia project: Wrong time, wrong place: wildlife conservation challenges in Karen State, Burma

Karen State, like other regions in Myanmar, is a biodiversity hotspot. It is one of the few remaining regions where top predators seem to be at high densities. The Karen Wildlife Conservation Initiative was established in 2012 to help survey the area and delineate areas for community forest and wildlife sanctuaries. However, despite its high value conservation status, funding for conservation support has been almost impossible to acquire, as donors are increasingly risk averse. The EAZA

/ IUCN SSC South East Asia Conservation Fund have just provided support for tiger surveying and protection in Karen State, demonstrating that the EAZA community has a recognisable and pragmatic role to play in in situ as well as ex situ wildlife conservation.

Making politicians take notice: How an EAZA petition could be most effective, and why young people are the key

Climate change is only just beginning to be noticed – but for future generations, it will be a central part of the political agenda. Mr. Sani, an expert in youth political engagement will introduce some of the techniques which have helped encourage UK legislators to take seriously the concerns of young voters, and for the first time in years include those concerns in their policies. EAZA's Pole to Pole campaign can help make young people more aware of the effect climate change will have on their lives, and encourage today's politicians to think harder about the need for action on emissions.

Conservation Plenary

The psychology behind pro-environmental behaviour

Many people believe that the environment is important and that we should try to act sustainably and environmentally, for example by reducing our energy use. However, people often fail to carry through their good intentions, but choose instead the easy or cheap environmentally-unfriendly option. Why is this the case, and how can pro-environmental behaviour be promoted? Ms Verhoef's research at Ouwehands zoo in the Netherlands tested how zoo visitors can be motivated to unplug their electronic devices at home. The results and implications of the study will be discussed.

Swedish zoos joining forces to raise awareness about climate change

This summer members of the Swedish Associations of Zoos and Aquariums organized national campaign days to highlight the Pole to Pole campaign. The aim was to raise awareness about the threats of climate change and to show that zoos in Sweden and around Europe together are fighting for the climate. The participants sent out a joint

press release to get as much media coverage as possible, then each park created their own activities for the days. This included recycling contests, guided tours focusing on polar species and distribution of tips and tricks on how you can make a difference in your everyday life. Some parks also minimized their own CO2 emission for the day by driving their vehicles as little as possible and serving vegetarian food in the restaurant at a reduced price.

Veterinary Plenary

Good veterinary practice is relevant to all EAZA collections and an important part of EAZA's professional standards. Prevention is better than cure is the European Union's slogan for its animal health strategy and this session will explore how this motto is applied to veterinary care and management in EAZA collections. As its chairman Jacques Kaandorp will highlight recent developments and the successes of EAZA's Veterinary Committee, its cooperation with the European Association of Zoo and Wildlife Veterinarians, and its vision and mission to address existing challenges in the field of veterinary medicine. Alexis Lecu will follow this presentation and present an update on transmissible diseases of concern such as Tuberculosis. What are the priorities for EAZA in this regard and why and how do we need to work together to maintain healthy animals and populations in EAZA. In the next presentation Stephanie Sanderson will explore the possibilities for population managers and veterinarian to work together to do just that - preventive management of diseases in the context of breeding programmes. The EAZA Group on Zoo Animal Contraception will follow with an update on their recent activities, followed by a talk

from Peter Donlon from ISIS who will introduce significant new release of the ZIMS: the Veterinary Module.

Good Veterinary Practice and the EAZA Veterinary Committee's mission statement and strategy

Easily endorsed highly emotional appeals to members of the public to reject practices from human care of animals through to management euthanasia have threatened to derail our commitment to the founding ideals of EAZA. Mr. Hodgson will explain how organisations can benefit from engaging with the public, explaining clearly the rationale behind our practices, and building a better informed constituency that not only understands better what we do, but actively works to be involved and supportive.

Values and Frames: How good communication can help put conservation on the map

Good communication practice is key to making our institutions and our visitors passionate about the conservation of nature.
