Host Organisation: HANA



The anaesthesia as an independent profession grew out of the surgical profession in Hungary. The Hungarian Surgical Society was founded in 1958, included a separate anaesthesiologist section. In 1966 the Hungarian Society of Anaesthesiology and Intensive Therapy was founded, and by 1984 an Anaesthesiologist Assistants' Section was formed within this society.

The Section worked very actively from the beginning, various committees were organised to solve the problems affecting the assistants.

The main goal was to connect the medical staff, doctors and assistants to unify their actions within the Society, and to unite their efforts on presence on scientific meetings.

Special assistants' training has been started in 1962 in Budapest and from 1977 it was available at several university centres. Also refresher courses were obligatory to attend in every 5 years.

In this early period only a few anaesthesiologists were trained, therefore in many (mainly countryside) hospitals have only the assistants to anesthetise under surgical supervision. Though the working conditions were difficult sometimes, the assistants loved and respected their profession and their mentor doctors.

To the 1990's the financial conditions of the health care were increasingly difficult, and that meant hard days to the anaesthesiology assistants, too. More tasks remained to the assistants' without the opportunity to employ more people or to further educate the remaining ones. Also the medical education itself was a subject to change.

Finally in 1995 the Section's board resigned, the new board re-organised the body of the Section, created several committees and regional liaisons. They have joint their forces with 13 other health care societies and formed the Healthcare Professionals Cooperation Forum to represent and support their professional goals as a political advocacy force.

As the Assistants' Section has over 1000 active members by this time, arose the question to found an independent society for anaesthesiology assistants. This came true on 28 February, 1998, when the Hungarian Association of Nurse Anaesthetists (HANA) was founded.

Of course, HANA is still a supporting member of the Hungarian Society of Anaesthesiology and Intensive Therapy.

We are also a member of the European Federation of Critical Care Nurses Associations (EFCCNA) and the International Federation of Nurse Anesthetists (IFNA).

From 2002, HANA is represented on the list of national of advocacy and social organisations.

For our 20th anniversary we are be delighted to welcome WCNA in 2018 in Budapest.

Workshops

For previously signed up participants there are five workshops in 4 topics organised. Organisers have a waiting list for late signups and they reserve the right to handle out free spots to ones from the waiting list upon no-shows.

Workshop 1 – Reanimation 14.30-16.30, Monday, 18 June 2018 Moderator: Zoltán Bakó, MD (Hungary)

This small group workshop aiming to improve the skills of the medical staff in peri-arrest situations. The situations are realistic clinical scenarios, wich are able to highligt the alarming signs of the critically ill patiens. Along the workshop we both practice to recognize and treat those patient , based on the current reanimation guidelines. Along the course the participant could try themselves in different clinical cases as a mebmer of the resuscition team, are able to learn the guidelines, the structure of different ER teams, and also practice the practical skills as using a defibrillator or AED and reanimation phantoms.

Workshop 2 - Haemostasis – Point-of-care 16.50-18.50, Monday, 18 June 2018

Moderator: János Fazakas, MD, PhD, Associate Professor (Hungary)

Current concept of the coagulation system

János Fazakas, MD, PhD, Associate Professor (Hungary) Participants in this session will gain an understanding of conventional and cell-based model of hemostasis with detailed aspects of global and organ specific hemostasis.

Differential hemostasis management based on factor concentrates and allogenic blood products

János Fazakas, MD, PhD, Associate Professor (Hungary)

In this presentation participants will review the treatment possibilities with the coagulation factor concentrates first to prevent and reduce the bleed, secondly to treat mild to moderate bleeding, finally they will gain an understanding of treatment of massive bleeding with the combination of factor concentrates and allogenic blood products.

Current guidelines

János Fazakas, MD, PhD, Associate Professor (Hungary)

Participants in this session will review the latest guidelines on management of major bleeding and coagulopathy in OR, the coagulation relation of regional anesthesia will be emphasized as well.

Bleeding complication and perioperative antithrombotics, anticoagulants

Anikó Smudla MD, PhD Senior Lecturer (Hungary)

Participants in this session will learn about the update in the management of perioperative management of anticoagulants, particularly the recent progress in the development of specific reversal agents of direct oral anticoagulants.

Point of care devices: TEG, ROTEM, TAG... when, what, how and plasma plus coagulation factor training

Anikó Smudla MD, PhD Senior Lecturer (Hungary)

Participants in this session will overview the POC tests of global blood coagulation and platelet function, they will have the possibility to experience, to practice with the POC devices.

Workshop 3 - Regional Anesthesia 10.20-12.20, Tuesday, 19 June 2018

Moderator: Gabriella Johom, MD, EDAIC, FCAI, PhD (Ireland)

This 2-hour regional anaesthesia workshop focuses on supervised hands-on needling practice and ultrasound scanning of relevant structures. It capitalises on a low participant: instructor ratio (6:1) and real time performance feedback. Workstations include spinal and epidural needle placement in a phantom, live model ultrasound scanning of the spine, peripheral nerves and fascial planes, as well as hand-eye coordination and needling skill practice in a gelatine phantom.

Upper limb scanning (live model): Dr Dávid Brenner Lower limb/trunk scanning (live model): Dr Attila Bondár Neuraxial block simulation/needling (phantom): Dr Ákos Sóti Scanning of the lumbar spine (live model): Dr Szilárd Szűcs Peripheral nerve block simulation (phantom): Dr Gabriella Iohom

At the end of this workshop, participants would have acquired knowledge of imaging and needling techniques for select regional anaesthesia procedures (both neuraxial and peripheral).

Workshop 4 and 5 - Airway Management / Difficult Airway

13.40-15.40 and 16.00-18.00, Tuesday, 19 June 2018 Moderator: Tamás Vető, MD (Hungary)

This workshop gives the participants an opportunity to practice the use of a variety of difficult airway management tools on airway manikins and have a better understanding of their use. All stations are manned by proficient instructors working at one of Budapest's largest tertiary referral centers, the Military Hospital. Each group of 5 participants will have 30 minutes at each stations.

Workshop stations:

- I. Front of neck access techniques: scalpel bougie tube, fine bore needle access, large bore cannula access (30')
- II. Fiberoptic intubation under general anaesthesia fiberoptic intubation via LMA, using a tube exchange catheter (30')
- III. Awake fiberoptic intubation focus on providing local anaesthesia of the airway (30')
- IV. Supraglottic airways, the intubating laryngeal mask and videolaryngoscopes (30')





Nurse Anesthesia Programs Applications Available for APAP Operated by IFNA

Nurse Anesthetists (NA), currently play a large role in operating room care worldwide. Current models of anesthesia care delivery worldwide include anesthesiologists working alone, anesthesiologists supervising NAs, NAs working independently, and surgery providers performing surgery while concurrently administering some form of anesthesia. Taking this background into consideration the International Federation

of Nurse Anesthetists (IFNA) has published standards for practice and education for nurse anesthetists as well as a voluntary Anesthesia Program Approval Process (APAP) offering three levels of approval:

Level #1: Registration; Level #2 Recognition; Level #3 Accreditation. Several categories of approval recognize the (1) diversity of nurse anesthesia programs throughout the world; (2) the capacity of a program given its national or regional context; (3) the resources available to individual programs; (4) a commitment of diverse programs to work toward meeting a common standard of educational quality.

APAP is the result of a coordinated effort by anesthesia leaders from various nations to implement a voluntary quality improvement process. It is a collegial approach to improving anesthesia education and promoting the administration of anesthesia by nurses while taking cultural, national or regional differences into consideration.

Twenty-four anesthesia programs located in Asia, Africa, Europe and North America have been approved since APAP was launched in July 2010. Consider joining your colleagues who have already received APAP awards for their education programs. It is a commitment to the promotion of education quality worldwide!


